5. Gradually increase the time spent away from the crate in a random pattern, ranging from a few seconds to several minutes.
6. End the training session on a positive note by allowing your puppy out of the crate without making a fuss.

### **Alone Time and "Forced Naps"**

Gradually increasing your puppy's alone time in the crate is essential for building confidence and independence. Begin by leaving them alone for short intervals, such as 5 minutes after they finish their KONG treat. Each session, gradually increase the duration of alone time by 1-2 minutes. If your puppy falls asleep during crate time, take advantage of the opportunity to extend the duration accordingly. Sleeping in the crate reinforces positive associations with the space and helps your puppy learn to settle down and relax on their own.

Ensure your puppy spends at least two separate periods of 30-60 minutes napping in the crate during the day.
